Ethical Issues Relating to Veteran Suicide Prevention

This session will be about the Veteran Population, assessment for suicide risk, various rules, regulations and responsibilities within suicide prevention, and how to implement the Code of Ethics in suicide prevention. There will also be an interactive discussion utilizing case examples relating to ethical dilemmas and consultation from ethics experts. Attendees will learn how to assess for suicide risk, how HIPPA regulations relate to suicide prevention, the role of Law Enforcement within suicide prevention and the guidelines for involuntary hospitalization.

A Comprehensive Approach to HIV Prevention and Care in America's Youth

"Woman's Best Friend": Social Work and the Animal Abuse/Domestic Violence Link

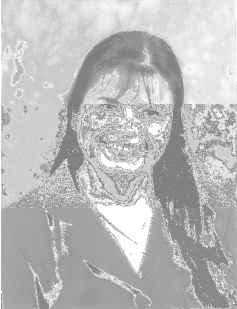

Animals and Society Institute, Kansas City, MO*

Pets are part of the environment of a majority of families and an overwhelming majority of children. Evidence-based research connects animal abuse and neglect with other family problems including domestic violence, child abuse, child sexual abuse, and elder abuse. An alarming number of women report that threats to their companion and farm animals prevent them from leaving abusive relationships; similar reports inform child abuse and elder abuse cases. Cruelty to animals frequently is an indicator and predictor of interpersonal, family and community violence, and is strongly linked to the criminal histories of juvenile offenders.

The area where animal cruelty, child maltreatment, domestic violence and elder abuse intersect is called "The Link." By focusing on the prevention of family violence and the resolution of family problems through this multidisciplinary lens, social workers and human services agencies gain a greater perspective of the needs, resources and environments of clients with complex and multiple needs. The Link approach offers improved opportunities to guide and inform effective prevention, assessment, intervention, and treatment strategies.

Through "The Link," innovative collaborative programs and public policy are helping abused women, children, vulnerable adults and animals. These include: adding pet questions to intakes, risk assessments and interviews; including pets in protection-from-abuse orders; providing housing for pets in women's shelters; establishing interagency and veterinary cross-training and cross-reporting protocols; using therapy animals in children's advocacy centers and courtrooms; including acts of animal cruelty within definitions of domestic violence and elder abuse; specialized psychological assessment and counseling for animal cruelty offenders; veterinary forensics investigations; and registries of animal abuse offenders.

The Heart of Safety: Compassionate Self Defense

As social workers we are often focused on the safety of others, but how do we keep ourselves safe as well? We frequently deal with people who are angry, frightened or desperate. We are less effective if we are also frightened. This workshop is designed to increase a social worker's competence when in a possibly dangerous setting, and thereby increase confidence and comfort, which will enhance the working relationship.

With this session participants will be able to identify risk factors and techniques to minimize them, demonstrate ways to break out of a hold, describe how an enhanced sense of safety contributes to a positive working relationship and outline a safety plan for multiple situations in which social workers might find themselves.

The Butterfly Effect: Where Psyche and Spirit Meet in Social Work Practice

In the Greek language, the word "psyche" means both soul and butterfly, symbolizing the transformative nature of social work practice. Exploration of spirituality is often an evitable stage of a client's journey to wellness. Through didactic presentation, small and large group discussion, and experiential activities, this session will provide participants with rationales for including spirituality in treatment with clients, responsible methods for working with clients who wish to explore spiritual issues, cultural considerations of spirituality, and material to assist in clarifying practitioners' spiritual self-awareness in order to address counter-transference which may arise.

Family systems have a general functioning—and each member of a family has an individual functioning which contributes strengths and challenges to the whole family unit. This workshop will present an overview of family systems theory and it’s usefulness in working with individuals to better understand their family functioning. Genograms, or “family maps” will be discussed and outlined as well.</p> <p>(2D) Finding the Positive Uses of Stress (3.0 clock hours) <i>Karen M. This presentation will provide and understanding of the dangers of chronic benzodiazepine usage. Benzodiazepines are more hazardous to withdraw from than opiates. Inappropriate long term use of benzodiazepines is common and clients often receive ill advise or no help from their doctors when they need to withdraw from the medication. Long term use of these drugs can cause neurological dysfunction that can take years to repair.

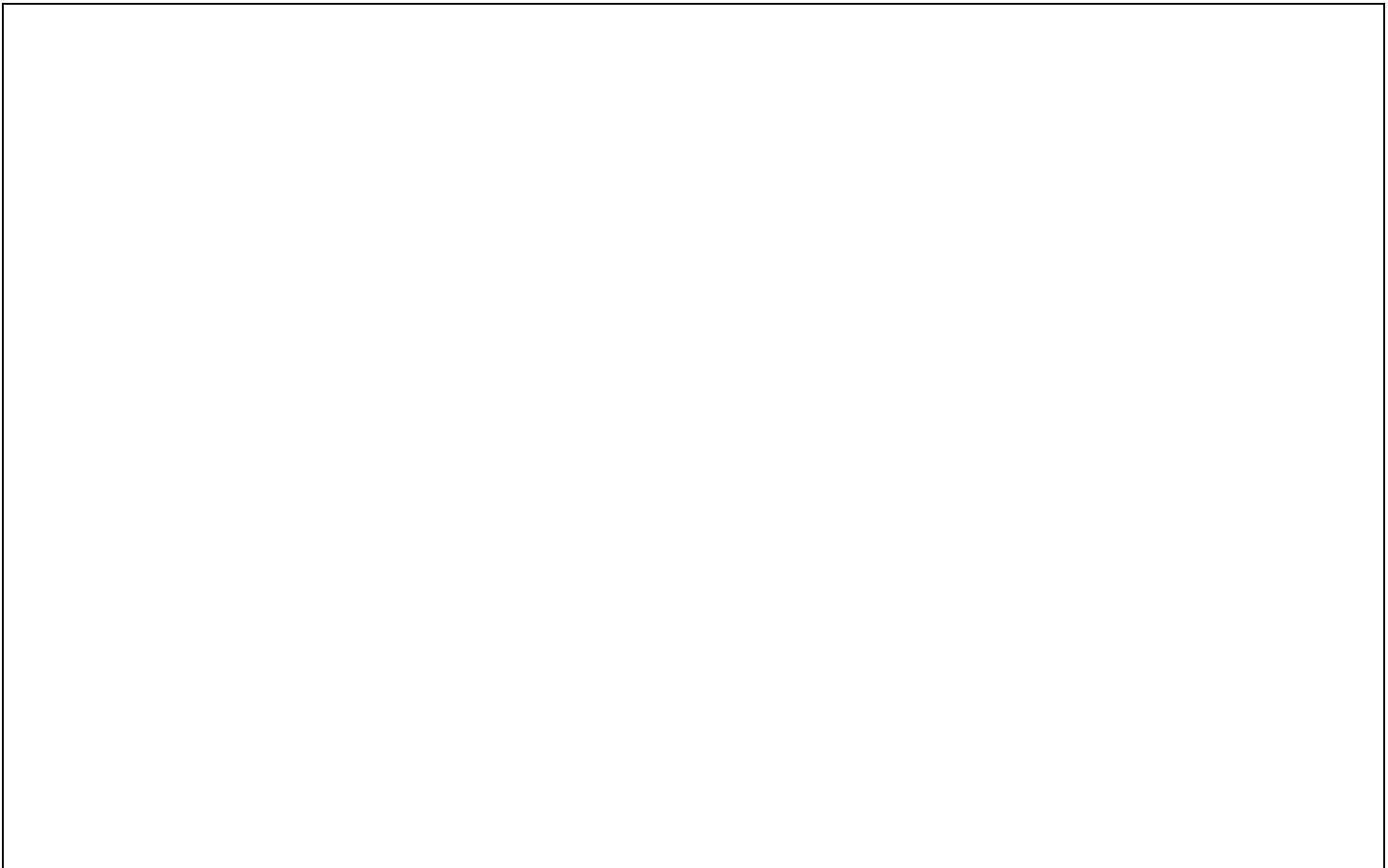

These children have done nothing to deserve this. They do, however, have to deal with the consequences of the choices of their parents. Attendees will learn to identify the 3 challenges that impact the parent-child relationship when it is disrupted by incarceration. They will also learn 4 emotional and/or behavioral responses that children often experience when a parent is incarcerated.</p> <p>(3B) Shattered Soul? 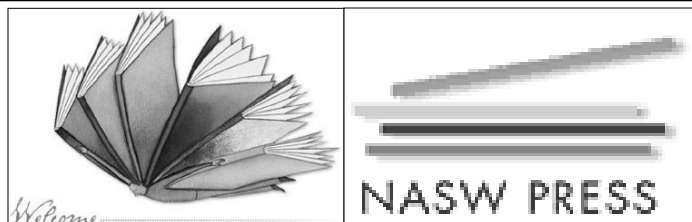
